

**Combatting Violence against Sex Workers**

The City of Edinburgh Council provided a small grant which enabled the production of 'Protect Yourself' - a personal safety handbook for sex workers.

**Working with Young People**

The Community Fund Scotland grant for the Young Persons Project ended in Oct 2002, it enabled SCOT-PEP to provide support to 87 sex workers aged 25 or under (49 aged 21 or under). Opening Doors - a report of the six years of the Young Persons Project is available on request.

Edinburgh Youth SIP provided a small grant between Nov 2002 and Mar 2003 to explore the feasibility of a Mentoring Project for young people involved in prostitution (aged 21 or under) which enabled us to provide support to 39 sex workers aged 21 or under. The results of the feasibility study alongside an independent needs assessment undertaken in Jan 2003 showed that the immediate needs of young people were far more basic and required resources to be targeted at establishing and maintaining contact with young people to respond to their emergency needs before they would be in a position to benefit from mentoring. Edinburgh Youth SIP have provided funding for 2003/4 to enable outreach to young people aged 21 or under involved in prostitution to be further developed. Long term funding for this critical area of work has yet to be secured. Although SCOT-PEP had no contact with young people under the age of 16 working in the Edinburgh sex industry during this period. two 14 year old and one 15 year old girls have been reported by other agencies to be involved in street prostitution. Since the loss of the 'toleration zone' it has become more difficult to establish and maintain contact with young people involved in street prostitution, particularly those just entering prostitution, as a result of the dispersal of street based sex workers across North Leith.

**New Futures Project**

Funding for this work ended in March 2002 and regretfully funding has still to be secured to enable sex workers in Edinburgh to explore their future options and choices.

**The staff team will continue to try and secure funding to enable the organisation to continue to maintain and develop support and services in line with the needs expressed by sex workers in Edinburgh.**

Expenses decreased from £339,267 in 2001/2 (15 month financial period) to £239,791 in 2002/3.

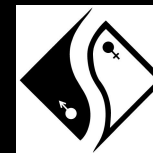

**PROMOTING  
HEALTH AND DIGNITY  
IN PROSTITUTION**

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The world has remained a cruel and unforgiving place for sex workers. SCOT-PEP service provision to both indoor and street based sex workers had to be reduced with the loss of the New Futures Project funding in March 2002.

The situation of street based sex workers since the loss of the designated area for street prostitution has deteriorated and many of the benefits of Edinburgh's pragmatic approach have been lost. Street based sex workers vulnerability to violence, abuse and exploitation has increased phenomenally. The trend of violence against street based sex workers has continued to increase this year with 40 Ugly Mug incidents being reported—a 400% increase in attacks. The eradication of the involvement of under 16 year olds in the sex industry has been lost with 3 under 16 year olds reported to be involved in street prostitution in the last year, while other crimes normally associated with street prostitution which had also been eradicated, such as drug use and dealing and protection racketeering have increased significantly impacting on the community and sex workers safety and well-being.

The new millennium has not heralded the social inclusion of sex workers. The on-going stigmatisation and further marginalisation of sex workers in Edinburgh requires society, and SCOT-PEP, to maintain it's essential purpose of delivering practical and emotional support to one of the most vulnerable and socially excluded communities in Scotland – **sex workers**.

Throughout this turbulent and challenging period our talented and dynamic staff and volunteer team adapted to the new working environment and maintained practical and emotional support to street sex workers and continued to further develop support and outreach services for indoor sex workers whilst dealing with the constantly changing and uncertain environment within which we were operating services and continuing the on-going battle to combat the social exclusion and isolation of sex workers in Edinburgh.

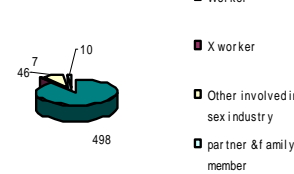

Who did we provide support to?

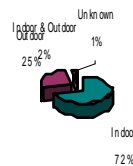
**Between 1 Apr 2002 and 31 Mar 2003 SCOT-PEP worked with 561 individuals, recording 3,641 contacts.**

Of our 561 service users 521 were female (493 workers), 34 male (5 workers) and 2 transgender (1 worker).

**Work Sector of Workers**



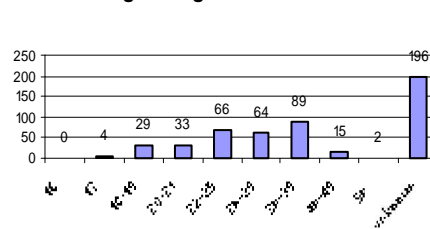
358 of our service users were indoor based sex workers, 61% of whom were in contact with SCOT-PEP for the first time in 2002/3. 39% of them are resident in EH postcode areas, 6% are

resident of other parts of Scotland, 2% are resident in England and 53% declined to give postcode details. During the year contact was maintained with workers in 32 establishments and establishment outreach undertaken in 28 establishments. Towards the end of the year SCOT-PEP began developing information and support services for sex workers advertising on the internet.

126 of our service users were street based sex workers, a dramatic decrease from the previous year, although the number of local women involved has remained constant. 80% are resident in EH postcode areas, 10% are resident in west of Scotland postcode areas and 10% resident in other parts of Scotland and England. 49% of whom were in contact with SCOT-PEP for the first time in 2002/3.

The age of sex workers accessing support and services within SCOT-PEP ranged from 17 to 55.

How did we provide support?

**Support was provided through office based services, mobile unit and outreach services**

The average number of individual service users accessing daytime office support and nighttime mobile unit and street outreach sessions were:

office support	4.92
nighttime mobile unit	9.06

**Drug Harm Reduction**

9,642 sets of sterile injecting equipment were distributed with 3,104 returns. 48 individuals accessed our needle exchange, all of whom were involved in street prostitution, 44% of whom accessed this service for the first time in 2002/3. These statistics reflect that 38% of street workers were involved in injecting drug use within this period. 69% were local, 10% were from the west coast and 21% from the rest of Scotland.

**Medical Outreach Services**

The Medical Outreach Team ran 32 clinics with 176 patient contacts in 2002/3. 77 individual service users accessed clinical services within SCOT-PEP, 47% of whom accessed our medical team for the first time. The medical outreach service was suspended in May and June 2002 due to relocation and finally suspended at the end of January 2003 after on-going medical staffing shortages which had resulted in an inconsistent service.

**Safe Sex Supplies**

SCOT-PEP distributed 95,307 condoms in 2002/3. 77,521 condoms were sold at cost price while 17,786 condoms were distributed free. The condom budget provided by NHS Lothian is not adequate to enable us to provide free condoms all the time for all sex workers.

**Volunteer Development**

The grant from Lloyds TSB Foundation Scotland enabled SCOT-PEP to continue the development of volunteering systems ensuring appropriate recruitment, induction, support and training to volunteers without whom SCOT-PEP could not provide the quality and/or level of support offered to sex workers in Edinburgh. 22 individuals actively volunteered within SCOT-PEP in 2002/3 of whom only 4 were involved in the sex industry. Funding to support the on-going development of volunteering and peer support is being sought.
